



## Girl Scouts of the Chesapeake Bay 100 Ways to Celebrate the 100th

### As a Service Unit

1. Add 100 new girls to your Service Unit or 100% of the Troops add one new girl.
2. Donate 100 books to your community library.
3. Plant 100 daisies (Juliette Low's nickname was Daisy) in your community.
4. Donate (or increase your donation) \$100 to The Juliette Low World Friendship Fund.
5. Locate 100 Girl Scout Alumnae in your Service Unit and invite them to a Service Unit event/meeting.
6. Create posters celebrating 100 years of Girl Scouting and hang them in your schools and the community.
7. Donate 100 reusable water bottles to a school in your community or a children's organization.
8. Take photos and create a manual or banner "100 Faces of Girl Scouts" depicting the diversity of our members.
9. Increase Service Unit per girl average of Cookies sold by 100 boxes.
10. Have 100% Troops participation in Fall Product Sales Program and the Cookie Program.
11. Collect 100 pairs of shoes, toys or articles of clothing and donate to those in need.
12. Donate 100 toiletry bags to a women's shelter.
13. Tie 100 green ribbons around trees on March 12, 2012.
14. Make 100 luminaries and display on March 12, 2012 to honor the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.
15. Hold a Family Partnership event with a goal of 10 new families attending and making a total contribution.
16. Donate 100 Birthday Boxes to a local food bank. Include everything for a child's birthday party; cake mix, icing, decorations, plates, hats, candles.
17. Create a centennial quilt or wall hanging with at least 10 squares representing Girl Scout activities, memories or special remembrances or Troop history and activities. Consider making a quilt from old Girl Scout t-shirts and displaying it.
18. Host a Service Unit 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary event.
19. Design a Service Unit T-shirt to celebrate 100 years of Girl Scouting.

### As a Troop

20. Add a new girl to your Troop.
21. Increase your Troop's Family Partnership contribution by \$100.
22. Visit Savannah, GA the Birthplace of Juliette Low or search on the internet at [www.juliettegordonlowbirthplace.org](http://www.juliettegordonlowbirthplace.org) for information on what you could do if you visited Savannah.
23. Sell 100 more boxes of Girl Scout Cookies than you sold last year.
24. Plant a tree or volunteer to help one day at a park or cemetery that needs help with upkeep.

25. Attend "Rock the Mall" on June 9, 2012 in Washington DC.
26. Increase your Troop contribution to the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund by \$100 more than last year or have every girl give 100 pennies or nickels to the fund.
27. Join the Juliette Gordon Low Birthplace Circle of Friends as a Troop with a gift to the Birthplace. Circle of Friends are Troops who support our efforts to preserve the birthplace of Juliette Gordon Low. A Troop membership is \$1 per girl with a minimum of \$10 per Troop and will receive a special certificate and may purchase a Circle of Friends patch.
28. Participate in a community event as a Girl Scout Troop and wear your uniform or carry a banner about the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.
29. Camp for 100 hours.
30. Recycle 100 pounds of trash.
31. Track the number of miles and accumulate 100 hours of walking, hiking or biking.
32. Make 100 "gifts" for Meals on Wheels or a local nursing home (placemats, tray favors or holiday cards, valentine's cards).
33. Create a display, banner or poster with 100 on it and display it in your meeting place.
34. Donate 100 pounds or 100 cans of food to a food bank.
35. Send 100 cards or notes to our Troops serving overseas through Operation Taste of Home. (Or participate in Stockings for Soldiers [www.stockingsforsoldiers.org](http://www.stockingsforsoldiers.org) by making 10 stockings and donating needed items.)
36. Learn about the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGS). Make a donation to the The World Foundation of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts [www.worldfoundationgggs.org](http://www.worldfoundationgggs.org); PO Box 416198 Boston, MA 02241
37. Collect and donate 100 "gently loved" stuffed animals and donate them to an organization such as a police department or homeless shelter in your town.
38. Create a list of 100 reasons to be a Girl Scout.
39. Sell or donate (as a Troop) 100 boxes of Cookies to Operation Taste of Home.
40. Earn a badge from a Girl Scout handbook from the 50's, 60's or 70's.
41. Collect 100 Girl Scout songs. Make a song book.
42. Invite former Girl Scouts to a Troop meeting, event or camping trip to show them how Girl Scouting has changed yet remains the same.
43. Collect 100 stories or memories from Girl Scout Alumnae or your family and create a scrapbook or video history of Girl Scouting in your community. This could be 10 stories from 10 girls.
44. Make a list of 100 famous Girl Scouts. Create a display and display it in the community or school.
45. Make a list of 100 ways to "make the world a better place".
46. Donate 100 flowers to a nursing home for Mother's Day.

47. Make 100 bookmarks and donate them to the library.
48. Make Cookies from an old Girl Scout recipe or use a recipe for sugar or vanilla Cookies and cut them in a trefoil shape to enjoy at a meeting or event.
49. Attend the 100<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration event in Ocean City, MD on March 10, 2012.
50. Attend the Centennial Jamboree event in Harrington, DE on October 19-21, 2012.
51. Visit the history exhibit at the Delaware History Museum starting February 16, 2012 and find 10 things that you did not know about Girl Scouts.
52. Juliette Low sold her pearls to finance Girl Scout activities. Make a piece of jewelry using a technique or materials of your choice.
53. Using an old handbook, find out about 3 types of lashing (square, round and continuous). Try one of the types while camping.
54. Borrow the Uniform Travel Bag from the Council offices and try on the old uniforms or have a fashion show.
55. Earn the GSCB Hats off to Girl Scouting patch.
56. Visit a museum and find out as many things as possible about what women did in the past and their opportunities and whether they worked outside the home.
57. Find out what life was like in DE, MD and VA 100 years ago as a child.
58. Learn about Lord Baden Powell and Lady Baden Powell and their role in Girl Scouting coming to the USA.
59. Using the internet visit all the World Centers and find out what happens in each place, programs are available to girls and how each Center began. What World Center was supported by a woman from the USA?
60. Participate in the Flat Juliette program and bring Flat Juliette to the history exhibit at Ocean City or Harrington.
61. Create a list of 100 things to do in the out-of-doors. Visit Delaware, Maryland and Virginia state parks websites

62. Collect 100 soda can tabs and donate to your local Ronald McDonald House.
63. From birth, Juliette's nickname was "Daisy". Create a flower arrangement that includes daisies and use it as a centerpiece for a Troop event.
64. Juliette Low loved animals. Plan and carry out a Take Action project that benefits animals.
65. Collect or create 100 outdoor recipes and make a Troop cookbook.
66. How many words can you create from the letters in "Juliette Gordon Low?" See if your Troop can make 100 different words.
67. Early handbooks included information of Morse code and Semaphore. Learn about these ways of communication and try sending a message to a friend.
68. Work with a another Troop, at a different program level, to do a centennial activity.

- 69. Hold a hula hoop, yoyo, bubble blowing, paddle ball or other funny competitions to see if you can reach 100 turns, 100 seconds or something similar without making a mistake.
- 70. Plan and hold a flag ceremony after you have learned proper flag etiquette.
- 71. Participate in a Scouts Own.

**As an Individual**

- 72. Become a Lifetime Member.
- 73. Reconnect with old Girl Scout Friends (Gold).
- 74. Make a New Friend (Silver).
- 75. Give 100 hours of Community Service for the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Project goal of 1 million hours.
- 76. Wear your Girl Scout uniform to school or your Girl Scout Pin to work on March 12, 2012. Or you may want to wear your uniform or pin to your place of worship on Girl Scout Sabbath/Sunday.
- 77. Make and distribute 100 friendship bracelets
- 78. Introduce Girl Scouting to a friend and invite her to a meeting.
- 79. Go camping with Girl Scout friends or family.
- 80. Create a Girl Scout scrapbook showing your experiences in a Troop or at camp.
- 81. Write a 100 word essay or poem about Girl Scouts.
- 82. Make a list of 100 things you learned in Girl Scouts.
- 83. Create a poster, painting or collage that expresses how you feel about Girl Scouts.

- 84. Conserve 100 hours of electricity.
- 85. Use a reusable water bottle for 100 days.
- 86. Share a Girl Scout smile and hug with 100 people during the year.
- 87. Read 100 books.
- 88. Read 100 minutes to a child or an elderly person.
- 89. Tell 10 people why you love being a Girl Scout.
- 90. Give 100 compliments.
- 91. Make 100 swaps and give them away.
- 92. Go 100 hours without “gadgets”. No computer, TV, cell phone, iPod, video game, etc.
- 93. Play outside for 100 minutes a week. Fifteen minutes each day for seven days.
- 94. Do 100 random acts of kindness.
- 95. Remember the Girl Scouts in your will or trust
- 96. Make a trefoil with 100 in the center and display it in your window or a public place.
- 97. Attend a Service Unit centennial event.
- 98. Be an active member of your Service Unit by participating in Service Unit Meeting or event.
- 99. Juliette Low was born in Savannah, Georgia. Cook a meal using foods Georgia is known for. (peaches, pecans, peanuts, Vidalia onions)
- 100. Live the Girl Scout Promise and Law everyday of your life.
